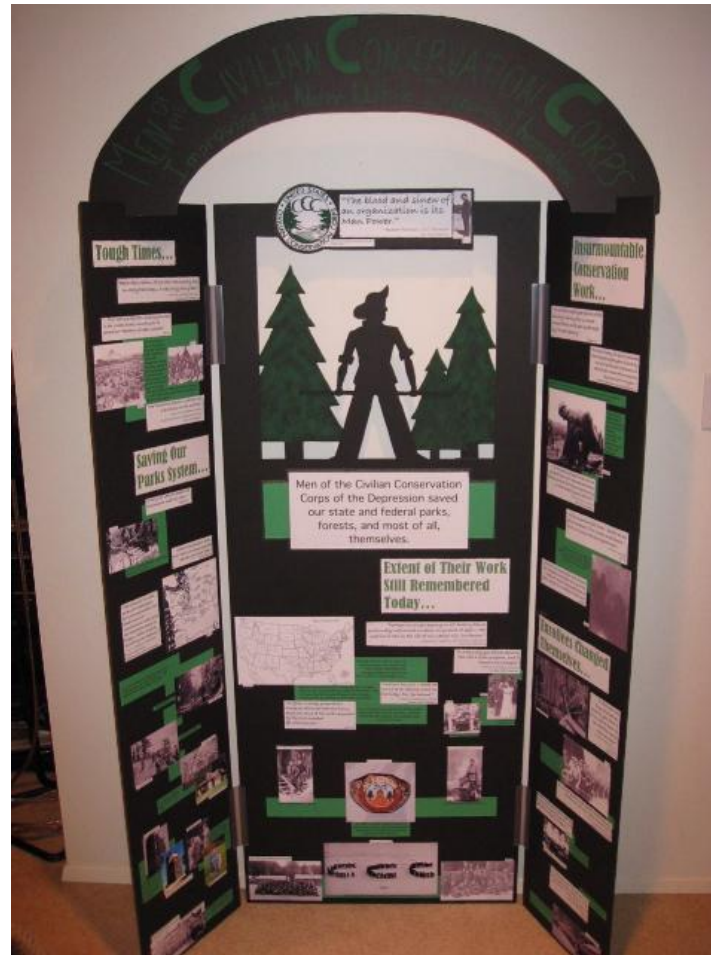


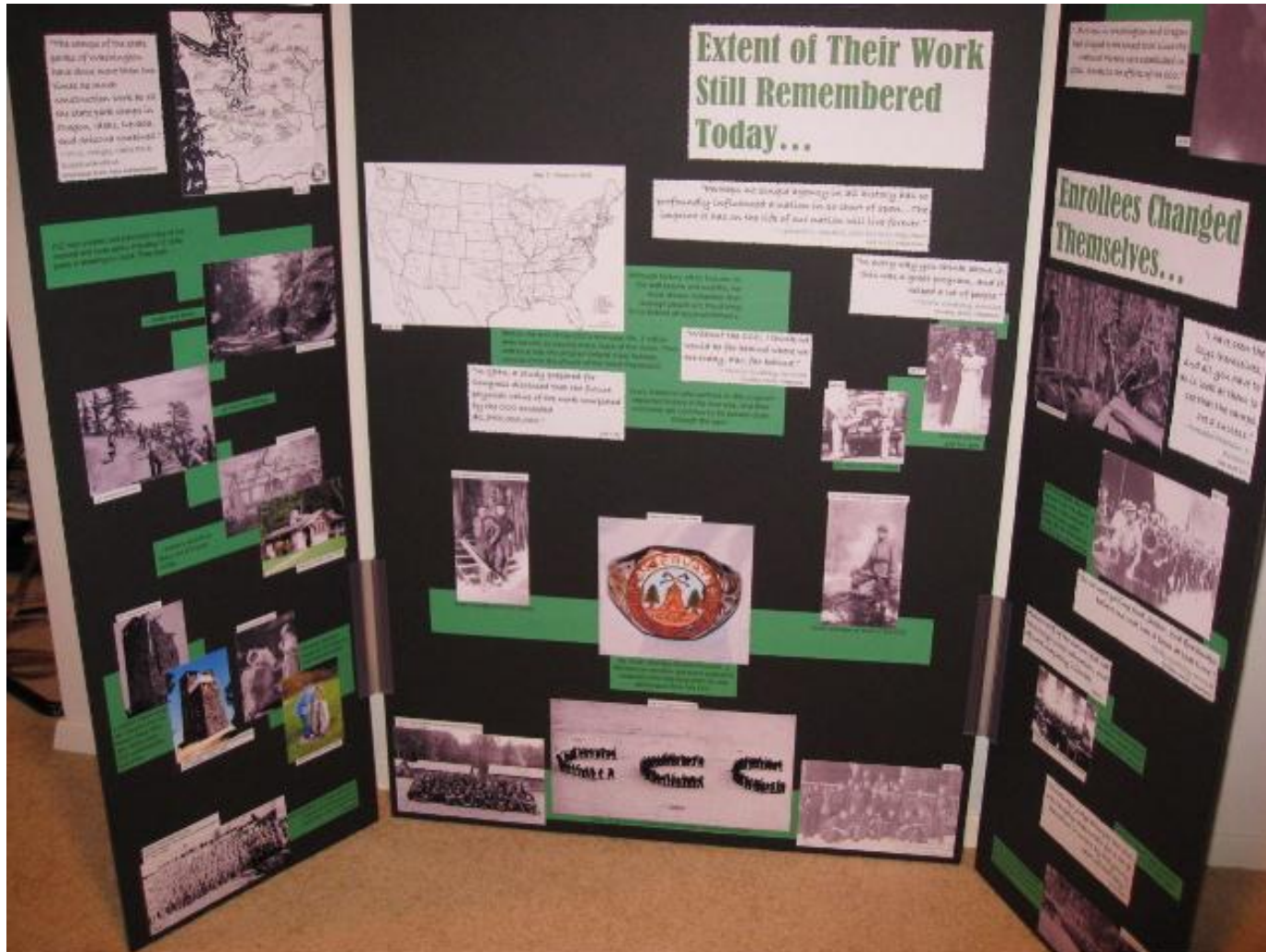
# Men of the Civilian Conservation Corps: Improving the Nation While Improving Themselves – Kelsie Haakenson, Senior Individual Exhibit

The United States was in the midst of the Great Depression. Banks closed and public park development halted. A growing number of starving unemployed Americans lived in hobo camps like this one in 1934 Seattle. Hope for change came with President Franklin Roosevelt's pride and joy, the Civilian Conservation Corps. (Roosevelt at first CCC camp, above).
